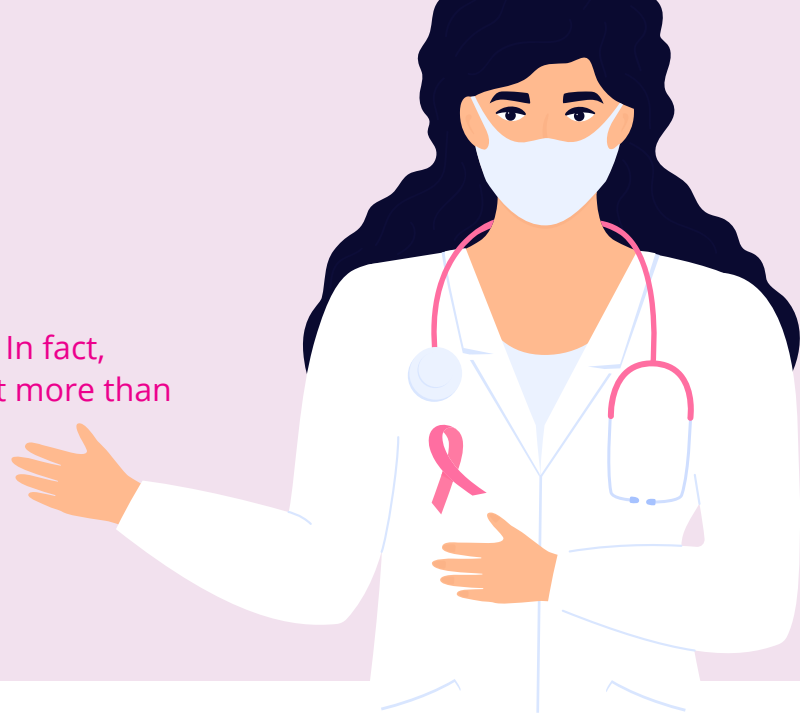


Breast Cancer Treatment

Doctors treat breast cancer in several ways. In fact, people diagnosed with the disease often get more than one kind of treatment.⁷



Surgery: To remove the cancer tissue.⁷

Chemotherapy: Doctors use special medicines to shrink or kill the cancer cells. These medicines can be in the form of pills, or they can be administered via an intravenous (IV) drip.⁷ Sometimes, both methods are used.² Doctors may even use chemotherapy after surgery to prevent the cancer from recurring.⁶

Hormonal therapy: This prevents the cancer cells from getting the hormones they need to grow.⁷ Doctors usually use hormone therapy after surgery, hormone therapy can also be used to reduce the chance of developing breast cancer in women considered high risk.⁶

Biological therapy: This therapy works with your body's immune system to help it fight cancer cells or to control side effects from other cancer treatments.⁷

- **Biosimilar:** A type of biological therapy approved to be highly similar to the reference medicine offering an alternative high quality, more affordable treatment option with proven noninferior efficacy and safety.⁸

Radiation therapy: Doctors use high-energy rays similar to X-rays to kill the cancer cells.⁷ Radiation therapy can be used after breast cancer surgery, or it can be used in addition to chemotherapy for widespread cancer.⁶
